## I am <u>against</u> providing the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA) with new powers to combat online misinformation and disinformation.

The bedrock of a strong democratic nation like Australia is the basic freedom of individual citizens or organisations to think, investigate and share information. The new powers for ACMA to combat online "misinformation" or "disinformation" would stifle that freedom.

The elephant in the room is exactly *who* will make the decision on what constitutes a "misinformation" or "disinformation"?
