Re: Communications Legislation Amendment (Combatting Misinformation and Disinformation) Bill 2023

I am writing to strongly oppose the Communications Legislation Amendment (Combating Misinformation and Disinformation) Bill 2023.

The current form of the bill endangers freedom of expression and democratic values in Australia and grants excessive authority to the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA). This raises concerns of government censorship and overreach and ultimately compromises individual rights. Excluding government-approved and professional news content from similar oversight also raises bias concerns, privileging specific narratives and hindering diverse viewpoints. Likewise, favouring endorsed content risks silencing dissenting voices and stifling community engagement.

In a landscape where information dissemination is influenced by a wide variety of interests, relying solely on a central authority to arbitrate truth can lead to skewed perspectives and the suppression of dissenting views. Additionally, the presence of corporate entities with vested interests in content regulation raises concerns about their ability to accurately assess information without being swayed by financial motivations.

The establishment of a framework to ensure transparency in content regulation decisions is of utmost importance. Any entity that benefits from such content regulation should be required to disclose their affiliations and interests, thereby enabling the public to easily identify and evaluate potential biases. The public also has a right to know what material has been classified as misinformation or disinformation, and easily challenge these decisions.

For instance, consider the guidance provided by the Australian government to the population regarding Covid-19 vaccination. Initially, this advice was heavily influenced by recommendations from the World Health Organization (WHO). Notably, the WHO receives substantial funding (as high as 88% of their total funding*) from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. Bill Gates subsequently personally benefited by amassing enormous revenues, exceeding \$200 billion USD, from the sale of Coronavirus vaccines. This situation exposed an extreme conflict of interest which unfortunately the Australian media and governing bodies still have failed to sufficiently address.

The Australian public recently endured excessive and unjustified government censorship of many important issues, without regard for fact. Evidence of the kinds of misinformation censorship that have already occurred was published on page 4 of "The Weekend Australian" 22-23 July in an article titled "Banned Covid Posts 'totally factual" by Chris Kelly (please see article attached at the bottom of this letter). This article states that many of the 4000 social media posts secretly censored by the government during the pandemic, despite containing factual information, were indeed heavily censored online.

This is the kind of censorship that can be extremely dangerous, as in this case the suppression of "factual" information may have resulted in the inadvertent harming of many people. For example, the suppression of such factual information may have resulted in both community and government support for extreme policy decisions, such as those that ultimately lead to the population being forced to choose to vaccinate against Covid 19, despite their personal wishes and beliefs, just in order to keep their job, run their business, enter a building or simply participate in everyday society.

By acknowledging the potential for conflicts of interest and taking proactive steps to mitigate them, we can work towards a more transparent, accountable, and fair information ecosystem. This approach would preserve the essence of diverse viewpoints and democratic principles while striving for accurate, unbiased information dissemination.

I implore the government to recognize the dangerous overreach in this legislation, withdraw the bill, and protect free speech and democracy in Australia. Thank you for considering my objection.
