

The National Council is mindful the AAA September Quarter *Transport Affordability Index* shows the typical Australian urban household now spends \$21,504 on transport costs (up \$607 from Sept 2021), while the typical regional Australian household now spends \$17,884 (up \$801 from Sept 2021) on transport every year.

The AAA's priority policy asks are:

- Use fuel excise paid by motorists to exclusively fund infrastructure.
- 2. Use infrastructure spend to save lives, not seats.
- Leverage Commonwealth's infrastructure investment to extract safety performance data from state road authorities.
- Use the shift to EVs to modernise Australia's taxation of motorists and road use.
- 5. Modernise regulation of vehicle emissions and fuel efficiency.

Issues for discussion

Road Safety

National Council looks forward to understanding the Minister's road safety priorities.

Safety is the AAA's top priority, and since 2020 the AAA has committed more than \$3.4 million to AAA Road Safety Research Program projects designed to deliver tangible safety benefits across Australia. Working with industry and academia, the Program is undertaking internationally significant research into driver fatigue, distraction, and the protection of vulnerable road users.

The AAA's priority ask is for the Commonwealth to leverage the significant land transport infrastructure funding it provides states and territories, to incentivise the provision of priority road safety data as a condition of funding.

The AAA believes the collation and reporting of appropriate data will allow for the quantification of Australia's road safety problem, the development of evidence-based solutions, and the cross-jurisdictional evaluation of various interventions. The reporting of comprehensive and timely data on the causes of Australian road crashes is the most meaningful contribution the Commonwealth can make to national road safety policy development and evaluation.

The AAA ask is supported by organisations such as the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons, the Australasian Trauma Society, Roads Australia, IRAP, the Australasian College of Road Safety, and the Australian Trucking Association.

The AAA notes the Minister has previously said "data quality is a longstanding issue in road safety, and accordingly we will look for opportunities to ensure we can over time extract better quality road safety data from states and territories in return for funding of road projects....Better data allows better targeting of the sites, circumstances and behaviours that impact on road crashes, and will help inform strategies to achieve set targets."

The AAA notes BITRE has reported (14 November) Australian road deaths increased 6.0% in the 12 months to 31 October 2022 (compared to the 12 months to 31 October 2021),

Infrastructure funding & tax reform

The AAA has long considered fuel excise to be a road user charge: 100% of which (net of rebates) should be re-invested in Australia's land transport network.

The AAA notes the October Budget shows the proportion of net fuel excise revenues being returned to the Commonwealth land transport budget over the next four years to be 91%, 97%, 92%, and 88%, and that this is a significant improvement on the 53.7% of net fuel excise spent on land transport infrastructure between 2011 and 2021.

The AAA is also mindful that fuel excise will decline as Australia transitions to a low and zero emission vehicle fleet.

The Commonwealth's desire to accelerate the increased supply of electric vehicles into Australia is welcome, but with this ambition comes a responsibility to develop an equitable and sustainable national motoring tax regime.

States are already taking different approaches to the implementation of road user charges for electric vehicles, and a nationally led approach is needed to deliver the necessary transition away from our infrastructure funding's reliance on the Commonwealth's fuel excise.

It's critical that new taxes on electric vehicles are levied at a rate that doesn't disincentivise adoption, however they also need to be implemented sooner rather than later.

Real World Testing

The AAA appreciates the \$14 million committed by the Government to fund the AAA to test and report the real-world emissions and fuel consumption for select new vehicles in Australia.

This program will dramatically improve consumer information provided to Australian motorists and subsequently reduce vehicle running costs, improve air quality, and reduce Australian vehicle emissions. It means Australian families and businesses will be able to make informed decisions about which new cars put the least pressure on the environment and the household budget.

Vehicle emissions

The AAA wants to help ensure Australian consumers can take advantage of global vehicle market shifts toward electrification and fuel efficiency in the coming years.

To best support and manage this transition, and ensure it is successful, sustainable, and delivered at least cost to consumers, the AAA believes Australia needs an integrated package of measures to address inter-related issues of vehicle fuel efficiency, energy security, fuel quality, tax revenue, and air quality.

Like many other transport sector stakeholders, the AAA supports the introduction of a fuel efficiency standard for the Australian new light vehicle fleet. However, there are a wide range of views amongst stakeholders regarding any possible standard's stringency and/or timeframes, driven by their respective environmental, commercial, or consumer interests.

The AAA supports the introduction of a fuel efficiency standard for the Australian new light vehicle fleet but expects the Government to strictly undertake the rigorous and robust evaluation needed to understand the respective costs and benefits of options and possible scenarios.

Rising cost of national road safety failures becoming clearer

Australia's peak motoring body says new data showing road deaths rose six per cent in the past 12 months makes clear Australia can't meet agreed road trauma reduction targets with its current approach.

The AAA is again calling on the Commonwealth to urgently table a coherent plan capable of addressing the worsening numbers, which show 1,196 people were killed on Australia's roads in the 12 months to 31 October 2022: a 6% annual increase at a time when the Commonwealth's National Road Safety Strategy is to purportedly halve road deaths in the decade to 2030.

Agreed by Commonwealth and state transport ministers in 2021, Australia's *National Road Safety Strategy 2021-30* aims to halve road deaths and reduce serious injuries by 30 per cent by 2030, despite the most recent national injury data being collected in 2018-19.

AAA Managing Director Michael Bradley said: "Our road toll is going in the wrong direction and people should be questioning our current approach to trauma reduction.

"There is an urgent need for the Commonwealth to declare the changes it will make, as our National Road Safety Strategy is not credible when one of its two key objectives is to reduce the incidence of a metric which is neither measured nor reported."

The *National Road Safety Action Plan 2021-25* drafted by the Commonwealth Department of Infrastructure was rejected by commonwealth and state ministers in February 2022 due to a lack of stakeholder support. Nine months later, no update has been released and the Plan is now two years overdue.

Mr Bradley said: "Reviews of Australia's road safety performance continue to identify the leading cause of Australia's failure to achieve road trauma reduction targets as being the Commonwealth's lack of leadership and coordination.

"It is not acceptable that in 2022, we have no national data on the quality of our road network, the types of road crashes occurring, the factors causing them, the enforcement of road rules, or their relative effectiveness, when road trauma continues to hospitalise 100 Australians daily and cost the economy \$30 billion annually.

"Commonwealth road safety data collation and reporting must be an urgent priority if road death and injury targets are to be met.

"The Commonwealth's ongoing failure to facilitate the timely, consistent, and open reporting of national safety data prevents Australia from quantifying its road trauma problem, developing evidence-based responses, or evaluating their effectiveness."

The AAA is one of many safety advocates to call for the Commonwealth to leverage the significant land transport infrastructure funding it provides states and territories to incentivise the provision of priority road safety data as a condition of funding.


