## **Mobile Coverage Programme**

### **MOBILE PHONE COVERAGE IN DUNGOG SHIRE**

#### **INTRODUCTION**

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comment on the best way to deliver the Government's funding commitment towards a program to improve mobile coverage and competition in regional Australia.

This program review, and mobile coverage in Dungog Shire more generally, was included on the agenda of the Ordinary Meeting of the Council of the Shire of Dungog held on Tuesday, 18 February 2014. The outcomes of that meeting, along with comments made at Dungog Council's Tourism Advisory Committee and the Dungog District Chamber of Commerce.

#### **ISSUE**

As mentioned in the Discussion Paper, Inadequate mobile phone coverage remains a significant issue for Australians living, working and travelling in regional areas of the country and this is certainly the case in various areas of Dungog Shire for local residents and businesses, and also for visitors to the area.

#### **THE CURRENT SITUATION**

Dungog Shire is in the Hunter Region of NSW and is renowned for its forests, mountains and picturesque river villages. The Local Government Area covers an area of 2248 square kilometres and is bordered in the north by the Barrington Tops plateau, which is part of the Great Dividing Range. The Shire consists predominantly of very rugged to hilly country which becomes less rugged from north to south.

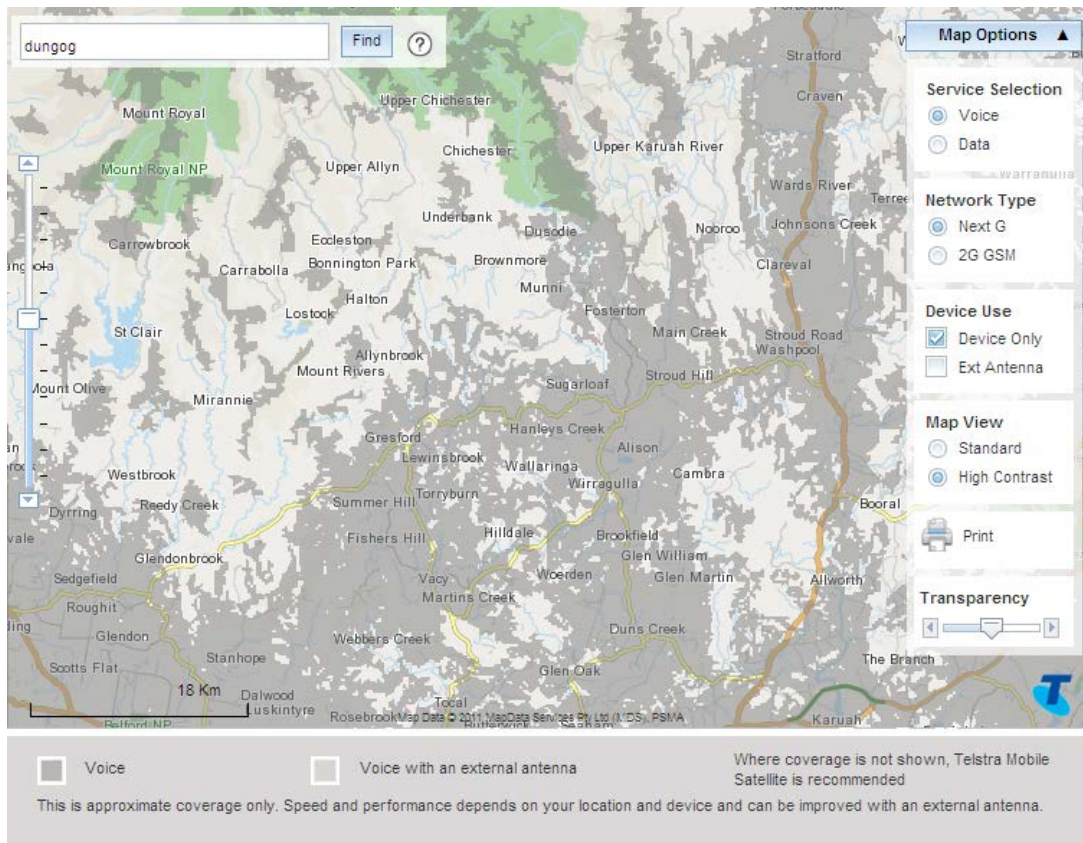
The Shire has two principal rivers, the Williams in the east and the Paterson (and its major tributary the Allyn) in the west.

The most notable area in the Shire where there is limited or no mobile coverage using a hand held mobile phone is the town of Paterson and surrounds. Coverage is also patchy in the Allyn Valley north of East Gresford, in the Paterson Valley north of Gresford and in the Williams Valley north of Dungog.

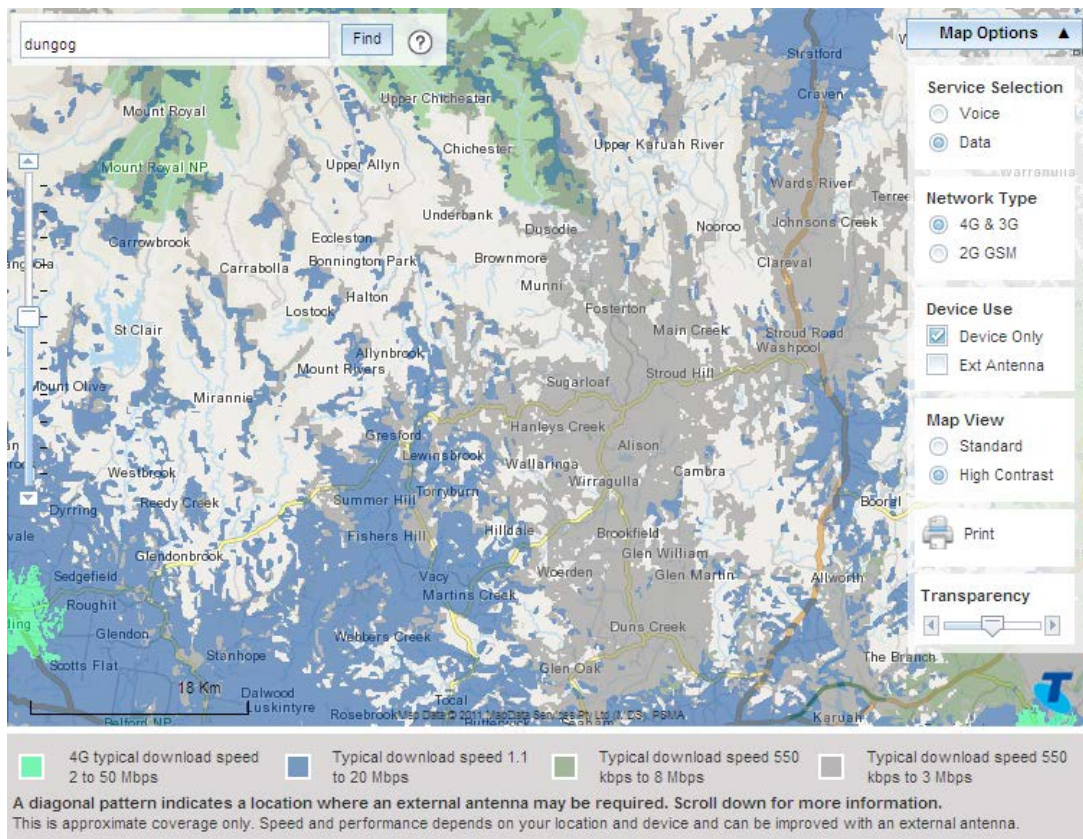
Residents particularly in the areas of Paterson, Vacy and Gresford have complained of poor mobile service for a number of years and people travelling from Maitland to Gresford find that their mobile service frequently cuts out at Tocal and does not really come on again until well north of Paterson.

## **OUR CASE FOR IMPROVED MOBILE COVERAGE IN DUNGOG SHIRE**

### **Our general response to the Department's invitation to make submissions**

There are a number of compelling reasons for appropriate/better mobile coverage in Dungog Shire, which include the nature of the local economy, the visitor economy and personal and community safety:

#### **Local Economy**

The Shire's economy has traditionally been based on agriculture and timber, with the alluvial river flats suitable for intensive agricultural production. The balance of the rural land has been traditionally used for grazing. Some of the considerations for improved mobile coverage include:

- The Paterson and Clarence Town district are the fastest growing areas in the Shire, being the closest to the major centres of Maitland, Raymond Terrace and Newcastle. The residents of these areas expect to have access to modern technologies equivalent to their friends and relatives living in more densely populated urban areas.
- The Maitland/Tocal/Paterson/Gresford Road is busy and is getting busier with a 17% increase in traffic between 2011 and 2013. It is a significant transport route with 3,653 vehicles per day in December 2013
- There are many people in the region who rely on mobile coverage for home and farm businesses and associated services such as farm contractors, livestock carriers, veterinary surgeons etc
- Adequate mobile service and other basic technologies should be available to those who wish to relocate to the Dungog Shire for lifestyle or business.
- Inadequate telecommunications infrastructure, including mobile telephone services, has seen a loss of businesses in Paterson. This includes the move of PowerServe, one of Australia's leading electrical power systems and cabling infrastructure providers, from Paterson to Thornton (northwest of Newcastle).

#### **Visitor Economy**

Tourism is also a focus of Dungog Shire's economy with the National Parks, State Forests, and the historic and scenic character of the area providing the major focus for attracting visitors. Visitation to the BTNP is estimated by the Department of Environment & Climate Change (National Parks) to be in the order of 700,000 to 1,000,000 people per annum, with visitation concentrated in the northern and central areas of the Park. The Department of Primary Industries (Forests) estimates that the Chichester Forest area in Dungog Shire attracts around 250,000 to 300,000 visitors per annum, including more than 100,000+ campers.<sup>1</sup>

Some of the considerations for improved mobile coverage include:

- In October 2012 Dungog Showground was the venue for a Mumford and Sons Gentlemen of the Road music concert. Approximately 13,500 people attended this event and the mobile network was unable to cope with the increased demand on services, even with the provision of an additional mobile tower.
- Tocal College, Tocal Field Days, Tocal Homestead attracts at least 40,000 visitors per year along with the on-going activities that occur at Tocal throughout the year
- The Paterson Valley is an attractive place for tourists and those who want to travel in the countryside but still be close to the coast and other amenities. It is the southern gateway to the Barrington Tops. Most of the tourism operators in the Paterson and Allyn valleys are members of an association named Allyn Paterson Valley Tourism (APVT) and their website is at <http://www.apvt.com.au/>
- Anti-social behavior in the Chichester State Forest in the Upper Allyn area during peak periods (Christmas and New Year Period, Easter, and the Labour Day weekend in October). The Police and local residents have expressed concern about the risks associated with large numbers of campers in this area due to the lack of mobile coverage, vandalism of the one public telephone and distance from the Central Hunter Local Area Command police stations.

### **Personal and community safety**

Dungog Shire residents are concerned about the risks of not having adequate mobile services, especially in times of emergency or natural disaster. Although Radio Dungog ("Dungog Shire's Own" community radio station, frequency 107.9) is broadcasting from the town of Dungog and their mission is ultimately to provide Shire-wide information in times of natural disasters and other emergencies, they currently only have a limited coverage around the town.

Some of the considerations for improved mobile coverage include:

- People living in the village of Paterson are totally denied any access to mobile phone coverage at present. This puts families at risk.
- Farming families living in many areas of the Shire, but particularly in the northern areas, are at risk when working on their properties without basic risk management devices.
- De-population of permanent residents or people using rural areas as weekend retreats, especially in the northern areas of the Shire, means that locals and visitors travelling our roads are at risk if there is a road accident or other incident due to poor mobile coverage.
- The region is prone to extensive flooding, often quite localised. Streams can rise rapidly, and a number of local rural roads have either fords, low level crossings or low bridges. These floods leave people isolated and often in need of technology support. The region is also susceptible to bush fires, exacerbating risks if families don't have basic phone services

Over the past few years there have been a number of declared natural disasters in Dungog Shire as shown in the table below.

Also, over the past few years the Dungog Rural Fire Service reports a number of incidents where Group Officers or Brigades have had to drive to the nearest elevated area to obtain mobile service (personal communication, February 2014). Sometimes this can be several kilometres and affects the effective management of the situation. Clarence Town Rural Fire Service has reported that they experience trouble at the head of Woerdens Road and around the Glen Oak area.

**Response to Q17.**

**Is there a more effective means of assessing seasonal demand than proposed in criterion 3(c)?**

The discussion paper indicates that \$20 million will be provided under the mobile blackspots project to address unique mobile coverage problems, such as areas with high demand for services during seasonal holiday periods.

The discussion paper indicates that each proposed base station (or group of base stations) will be assessed according to the extent of coverage benefit and one measure suggested is the number of sites/rooms/cabins offered by accommodation providers (for example, motels or caravan parks) within the new 'handheld' and 'external antenna' footprints.

We suggest that a better measure of increased demand on mobile services might be a comparison between the average annual number of visitors (e.g expressed as average weekly or monthly numbers) and the average number of visitors in peak times. This would take into account day trippers, as well as people staying in paid accommodation and people staying with friends and relatives (see Destination NSW Growing the Visitor Economy at [http://www.destinationnsw.com.au/\\_data/assets/pdf\\_file/0003/79734/LGSA-Conference-presentation-March-2012.pdf](http://www.destinationnsw.com.au/_data/assets/pdf_file/0003/79734/LGSA-Conference-presentation-March-2012.pdf))

Importantly, peak times could be during public holiday long weekends, school holidays, winter or summer or transition seasons, as well and periods associated with major events. As mentioned earlier in this submission, major events in Dungog Shire such as the annual Small Farms Field Days at Tocal (near Paterson) and the Mumford and Sons Gentlemen of the Road concert in October 2012 put increased pressure on the mobile service.

Attachment 1 on the following pages indicates the number of events in Dungog Shire that are impacted by poor mobile coverage in the local area. Several of the events are located in Paterson township and others are located in the more remote parts of the Shire, especially north of Dungog and East Gresford.
