I had country relatives all around Victoria, who lived and breathed for the ABC's dependable broadcasting - a tradition never to be broken. You could say I am passionate about the quality and service we receive from the public broadcaster and above all its integrity.

The ABC was never established for economic purposes. It is a purely independent organisation. Subject: Sharks and dolphins: Why the ABC must stay in public hands

I'm a 34-year-old writer and editor with a background in education. The Liberal Party Council's recent vote to privatise the ABC caused me great concern and prompted me to write this submission.

For as long as I can remember, the ABC has been a campfire to warm myself by. As a young child, I watched Playschool every day, after impatiently waiting for 'the mummies' show' PGR to finish. I was deliciously terrified by The Trapdoor and thrilled by the futuristic adventures of Astro Boy. As a young teenager, I adored the afternoon children's programs, from Captain Planet to Heartbreak High. (And why can't I find anyone else who remembers the cartoon MOT?)

In the evenings my parents would settle down to watch the nightly ABC news, followed by the 7:30 Report (and of course Four Corners on Mondays). Long before I understood what the issues were about, I learned to tell the time by the familiar music that played at the opening and closing of each show. Friday night was crime drama night. I've lost count of the number of times I sat down with Mum and Dad to soak up the latest bleak, fiendishly clever British detective show without the irritating interruption of ads.

It was strange and bewildering to visit friends' houses and find that they watched commercial news programs instead. It all seemed too loud, garish, aggressive and scornful, particularly the current-affairs shows with their constant 'gotcha' exposure of rip-off artists and bludgers. Alien to the cool blue tones and dignified demeanour of the ABC reporters.

Even so, the commercial channels had plenty of entertaining flash and zing. Disney cartoons, game shows, advertisements for must-have toys, the latest hit dramas from edgy North America as opposed to cosy Britain. To my youthful mind, Channels Seven, Nine and Ten were 'cool'.

The ABC wasn't cool. It was important.

In the last decade I've often worked at home, starting at lunchtime and finishing late at night. Before getting stuck in, I listen to ABC Radio National's Conversations with Richard Fidler followed by The World Today. They sell me nothing. They tell me everything. I learn more in those two hours than I did in a week at school. What commercial radio station would devote an entire fascinating hour to a leisurely chat with an ordinary Aussie about their extraordinary life? What commercial radio station has time to stop and think about complicated world politics amid the barrage of ads, wacky noises, competitions and gimmicks? At other times I enjoy regular Radio National's discussions from political viewpoints as divergent as Philip Adams on the left to Amanda Vanstone on the right. I don't agree with everything they say, just as I don't approve of everyone who appears on Q&A or runs an opinion piece on the ABC news website. In fact, I often hear or read things that make steam come out of my ears. And that's how I know the ABC represents a range of perspectives. The Guardian, now: I agree with that paper almost all the time. It lines up with my personal politics almost perfectly. That's how I know it has a political bias... and that's why I try to double-check its claims on any given day. How? By seeing what the ABC has to say.

In 2017, housesitting for my parents while Cyclone Debbie drenched Queensland, I hauled boxes upstairs (in case the creek out the back overflowed) and listened to Radio National's nonstop emergency coverage tirelessly keep listeners across the state updated and informed. Nobody was trying to sensationalise the disaster. Nobody cared about getting the scoop or winning a ratings war. Just people helping people, keeping the lights on in the dark.

And over the last five years I've watched with sad frustration as the ABC suffers death by a thousand cuts. Ever since the Abbott-Turnbull government took power in 2013, they've been slowly but steadily chipping away at the ABC. Endless funding cuts. Sniping and complaining whenever the ABC's news service dared challenge them or hold them to account. I've watched my beloved ABC eroded until Lateline disappeared, and The World Today was cut in half, and the 7:30 Report was nationalised. I've watched as the ABC has weathered the storm and kept on trying to inform, educate and entertain in the face of gale-force winds. All because our leaders on one side of politics can't take criticism.

This inquiry seems to imply that the ABC (and SBS) enjoy an unfair advantage over commercial media outlets, and that this ought to be resolved in favour of the commercial media. This is like saying that all

dolphins should be killed off to make room for more sharks.

I don't mean to disparage sharks. They're a vital part of the ecosystem, just as commercial media is a vital part of a healthy democracy. I thought sharks were cool when I was a kid, too. I still do. But what matters to sharks is survival. They must swim constantly, forever chasing their next meal. Compassion and deep thought are luxuries sharks can't afford. They smell blood and weakness from far away, and savage their prey without mercy—yet flee the new and strange.

Just as evolutionary pressures have shaped sharks into survival machines, the profit motive shapes commercial media. Commercial outlets can't easily devote themselves to the public good. It's not in their DNA. They provide a service in order to make money. Anything that fails to make money must therefore be sidelined (unless wealthy backers happen to have an ideological axe to grind). Education and sympathy can't compete with the scoop and the front-page headline, because that's what sells, and selling keeps them alive. They must be wary of anything that makes their advertisers skittish—even if that means painting a warped picture of Australia that bears no resemblance to reality. And, of course, they're always tempted to keep their expenses down by lowering the quality of their service.

Brilliant panel ABC comedy shows such as Good News Week and The Glasshouse have migrated to commercial networks and mutated into crude, callous versions of their original cheeky selves, chasing shock value in a relentless drive for ratings. They can't help it. The imperatives are too different.

It's natural that commercial media outlets should resent the existence of public broadcasters. Sharks no doubt wish that dolphins would just go away and stop annoying them. Both swim in the same water. Both eat fish. Yet the world would be the poorer for the loss of either creature.

Dolphins are affectionate animals. They have time to play. They leap out of the waves for the sheer joy of it. They care for one another—and get into fights, of course. They're far from perfect. But they know what makes life worth living, as opposed to mere survival. They push drowning dolphins (and people) to the surface to breathe. Dolphins aren't cool. Dolphins are warm.

A dolphin fin might resemble a shark's from a distance, but I know which one I'd rather see when I'm trapped in a lifeboat in a stormy sea. In the same way, if a news van turned up outside my house tomorrow, I'd be wary... unless it was the ABC.

Public broadcasting serves the public good. You put money in and you get a service out. It's the polar opposite of commercial media. Public broadcasting is largely free from the ruthless 'swim-swim-hungry' pressures on private media. It has only one overriding remit: to ensure that taxpayers' money is well spent. That's why Australians trust it. I know I can rely on the ABC to keep people in regional areas connected, to pursue tough investigative journalism without the tempting distraction of sensationalist reportage, to examine issues in a balanced way—because its job is to benefit all of us. Not the left, not the right, not the fringes. Everyone.

The ABC's Q&A and The Drum, and SBS's Insight, allow topical issues to be discussed and politicians to be put on trial by ordinary Australians rather than just media personalities. When I watch these shows or listen to them on the radio, I hear from people from the left, from the right, from the centre, from fringes so far out I can't believe they exist; Christians, Muslims, Hindus, Sikhs; Africans, Chinese, Micronesians, Indigenous people, even those weird Americans; artists, pollies, comedians, scientists, blue-collar blokes and sheilas, schoolkids and sex workers. People who aren't always conventionally good-looking or slick, like the ones I see on the commercial programs. Instead they show the quirks and complexities of real Australian life in a way the private outlets try their best to gloss over.

The ABC and SBS belong to the taxpayer. I might point out that those taxpayers include all the people employed by the private outlets as well. People who know firsthand the limitations of the commercial business model. I might have compared commercial media outlets to sharks, but I refuse to say the same of the people who work for them. After a hard day's work keeping the shark swimming and feeding, don't they too deserve well-funded, high-quality public broadcasting that can address aspects of their lives the private media can't or won't touch?

Don't they too deserve a 'Mental As' special week of programming that addresses common mental health issues and reassures them they're not alone? Don't they too deserve a Fact Check on news reporting, expert election night coverage, a thoughtful review of the week in politics on Insiders and a humorous shredding of their media rivals' excesses on Media Watch? Why shouldn't they too get to enjoy programming as whimsical as a Shaun Micallef skit show, dorky and metatextual as Whovians or hard-hitting as Mystery Road?

Consider The Gruen Transfer, an ABC show that dissects advertising. Surely here is an example of a publicly funded program that benefits commercial media. How could anyone reasonably expect a private media broadcaster to smear its advertising lifeblood under a slide and examine it under the microscope? That would risk offending the companies that keep its heart beating and endanger its very existence. Yet by studying the flaws and follies of advertising, and keeping an eye on its trends, everyone benefits—including the health of the commercial outlets that rely on it. From the perspective of their staff, Gruen ought to be the equivalent of a blood test or a pacemaker.

Public broadcasting belongs to all of us. Including you. Yes, you, sceptical reader of this submission. Do you really believe that Australia would be a better, fairer, kinder place if the ABC and SBS were privatised? If every media outlet behaved like Channel Nine, or Sky News, or Foxtel, hungering after ratings and putting money before people? If the sharks ate the dolphins and replaced them with more of the same? No, of course your inquiry isn't directly concerned with privatisation... but many people, myself included, suspect that it was set up as yet another step along that dangerous path.

As the inquiry itself notes, the greatest pressure on Australian media outlets comes from international corporations such as Facebook and Google—yet the inquiry seems more concerned with possible conflicts within the Australian media. It seems short-sighted to squabble over the proportions of meat and pastry in the Australian pie when the social-media giants are biting huge chunks out of it. They are the real problem commercial media outlets face. Blaming their woes on the ABC and SBS, with whom they have coexisted for almost a century, is nothing but a short-sighted tantrum.

I didn't write this submission to tell you what to think. I wrote it to make you think. That, in the end, is the ABC's job. That's why it should be left alone. Regards,

For as long as I can remember, the ABC has existed in some form. I grew up with it and its offerings woven into the fabric of my life. My adult children were raised with it. As a university-level trained pre-school teacher, I valued its educational programs, like Playschool and Sesame Street, for the intelligent contribution they made to their young lives. Now my grandchildren are being raised with the ABC, relishing again Playschool, BTN, the littlest doting on Peppa Pig and other ABC- kids offerings. It is routine when I care for them to have the ABC- kids channel on for part of the time with the youngest singing along with Playschool presenters and wanting to carry out the 'experiments' and try craft activities.

As an extended family we watch almost no commercial television and find ourselves far from alone among our friends and acquaintances in this. We find commercial television riddled with advertising (rendering any quality programs almost unwatchable), heavy with 'reality' shows and formulaic comedy and drama which contribute little of lasting value to our lives.

We obtain all our news and current affairs from programs on the ABC, agreeing with the majority of Australians surveyed that it is Australia's most trustworthy source. In these days of 'alternative facts', opinion presented as fact, paid advertising masquerading as 'news' and celebrity gossip content, we do not trust commercial sources to fully inform us.

Much has been made of perceived ABC bias. We do not find such a bias. If it existed, it has been eradicated by successive, mostly conservative, governments. The ABC is constantly being held to account for its balance, unlike commercial media. I read that the proposal was to "sell the ABC to a mogul". Rupert Murdoch already owns the greater share of the country's mainstream media landscape and clearly supports through these outlets a conservative agenda. Putting the ABC into a conservative-supporting mogul's hands would further limit the diversity in what is already one of the least diverse mainstream media landscapes amongst modern western democracies. This would be very detrimental to our democracy and our way of life. Drama - while commercial media does have some locally produced content, the ABC and SBS have punched well above their weight with this. Local content provides local jobs, not just for actors, but production crews, accountants, caterers and everyone involved.

Starving the ABC of funds is just as bad as privatising it. It needs to be properly funded to do its job. Its job is not to compete with commercial media - as I have shown it provides a different service to commercial media. We are all Australians, but commercial media will only cater to those it can monetise with shows that polarise and divide us.

We could rely upon our ABC to be impartial, to deal with issues that the government of the day might prefer to ignore or avoid, and to explore many, many topics over a wide range of themes and categories in depth.

My husband grew up in country WA where the ABC also provided a crucial role and continues to do so today. We now live in Busselton, and our local programming is perfectly tailored to meet our particular needs as regional listeners.

The ABC is an outstanding institution, providing a huge variety of programming on a multitude of topics and now using a range of different media platforms to appeal to a wide audience.

It caters for the highly diverse interests and needs of Australia's multicultural population, and does so in an impartial way that is only possible because it is a publicly funded institution that is not controlled by the financial interests of any particular corporation.

The production of many fine drama programmes over decades has only been possible because of the wise investment of our public money. The ABC has also enabled the many hundreds of staff who are responsible for providing the excellent programming to establish and develop their professional skills. The job security (although not as stable as it once was) provided by working for the ABC is particularly valuable for young media workers and technicians, who need opportunities to enter the workforce and follow their passion for a career in broadcasting, whatever form that might take.

The thought that this wonderful institution, set up to provide programming for all Australians and without commercial interference, might privatized absolutely appalls me. The difference in the quality of programming between the ABC and commercial media broadcasters is stark. There is simply no comparison between commercial radio programming, with it's limited format, and the richly varied offerings of ABC radio. It is also ironic that many TV programmes originally broadcast on the ABC are now being shown on commercial television!

Our ABC is of immense social and cultural value that cannot be understated. It is an anathema that one group of individuals with a clear political bias and personal agenda should seek to destroy an institution that is of immense value to all Australians, and to the extensive overseas audience who also value and follow ABC programming. If you listen to night time local radio, you will often hear from callers as far away as Delaware, and Tokyo.

I love my ABC. For me, as a stay-at-home parent, it is my window to the world. I have learned so much from my listening and viewing. I feel connected to my community and my country, I feel challenged, uplifted, sometimes very cross, but always enriched by what I hear and see.

I cannot bear the thought that this wonderful and precious institution might be destroyed.

Please, leave Aunty alone. Restore the funding that has been eroded over the last few years and recognize the immense value and social good this wise investment will bring.

This submission conveys an objection to any proposal to privatise the ABC. Do not label this submission as a comment and hence ignore it.

It is my will that the ABC not be privatised, and that its funding be restored to a level sufficient to carry out its charter.

The primary purpose of the ABC as codified in legislation is to provide a public service. This service includes the principles of

- nationwide availability
- programs for minorities, including the Indigenous population
- promotion of a sense of national community
- · editorial independence
- little or no interference from vested interests
- qualitative programming rather than merely quantitative
- direct funding by the taxpayer.

I for one am entirely happy to devote some (or all) of my taxes to supporting the ABC (and SBS), just as I am happy to help bear other people's burdens by contributing to the Medicare system.

The cost of running the ABC is not large compared to other budget items. It is small compared to the cost of, say, defence or foreign aid. The benefits the ABC brings to Australian residents are large compared to the cost.

In a referendum in March this year Switzerland voted to continue financially supporting the Swiss Broadcasting Corporation (SRG SSR) by means of licence fees. They did this in spite of claims that the SRG SSR is out of step with modern media usage patterns. Its supporters see the broadcaster as a guarantee that all Swiss residents receive public information without any linguistic barrier.

The relevance to Australia is clear: everyone can receive important news and opinions regardless of where any media profit centre may lie, which would inevitably be the major cities. Rural areas would, of course, be treated as cost centres rather than sources of profit and given little or no service. Why is Telstra, what's left of it after privatisation, still required to provide a customer service guarantee in rural areas? Would the equivalent be required of a privatised ABC? If not, why not?

I especially value the ABC's role as a commercially- and politically-independent service. One of its tasks is investigate and report on what the government of the day is doing. If the government of the day finds this sort of scrutiny irritating or ideologically unpalatable, that is very good. It means that the ABC is doing its job and prodding those in power to stay honest.

A publically-funded broadcaster and its journalists are outside the control of vested interests and for-profit media. Ancient adage: you are the servant of whoever pays you; if the ABC is constrained to rely on private sector funding, it necessarily becomes the servant of the private sector. Its programming and reporting will inevitably be influenced by what the paymasters wish to broadcast. This is not a balanced, neutral situation.

What we have at the moment is a right-wing government chronically claiming that the ABC is biased towards the left. This is confirmation bias. My experience is that left-wing governments also claim bias on the part of the ABC. The goal of governments of all political complexions is of course to establish a bias in their favour, label it as 'neutrality', and circumvent the law by starving the ABC of the funds needed to

perform its stautory role. That's just too bad: the ABC has editorial independence and should be left alone to exercise it.

The public have historically shown themselves to be very supportive of 'their' ABC. Evidently they trust it. Any attempt by any government of any political orientation to damage or destroy the ABC (and SBS) has met and will meet with widespread popular resistance and electoral repercussions.

There are no guarantees that a privatised ABC will have the funds to keep up with changes in technology, nor even to meet such service obligations as may be written into a new charter. The current funding arrangement is comparatively simple and avoids the problems and pitfalls of tactics such as selling subscriptions and underwriting spots, holding on-air pledge drives and chook raffles, or program-by-program funding. In the US, studies by the Government Accountability Office and others conclude that for radio stations in rural areas private financing would not make up for the loss of taxpayer funding. Would the situation be any different in the case of the ABC? If not, why not?

The issue of competitiveness is a complete furphy, a series of breadcrumbs to lead people into the privatisation trap. With whom is the ABC competing? Its purpose is not to compete. The neoliberal ideology that turning over every aspect and facet of economic life to The Market will solve all our problems and absolve us from the need to plan and to think is patently untrue. For a start, witness the deliberately confusing telecommunications market, the inefficient electricity market, and the appalling and exploitative behaviour of the big four banks. The Coalition has wasted two years defending the banks against clear cases of widespread misconduct and poor or no enforcement of law. Would a totally privatised media industry have reported on this?

Has any government tried to introduce competition into the area of scrutinising and reporting on the behaviour and practices of government? No, it's the other way around: ever more the government of the day seeks to conceal as many of its activities as possible. Everything these days is categorised as either "National Security" or "Commercial-in-Confidence." Transparency is lacking. The public isn't consulted, it's advised.

It has become apparent in the light of experience that rendering up public sectors of the economy to The Market does not necessarily or ever simplify life for customers. To do so may satisfy some notions of efficiency or effectiveness, but seldom does the system become more resilient.

Privatising the ABC is no more than the confiscation of an asset already paid for and owned by the taxpayer and handing it cheaply to vested interests, who will inevitably prove to be rentiers and erect a paywall around all that it offers. Such a good idea: bleed the taxpayers twice.



Subject: Public ownership of the ABC is in the national interest: Why?

To Whom it may concern:

This is a story about engaging ALL Australians in communal sharing of our stories, of sharing our needs. Of listening, and learning to better see through the eyes of others. No matter how much we disagree with them, in how much poverty they live, or how few in number- of at least *trying* to empathise and understand how and why they think as they do.

It seems clear to me that because privately owned media has to at least break financially even, the number of consumers who support that product has a certain minimum number. Hence it is competitive business practice to target those opinion- and needs-groups which are largest.

Moreover, it is human nature to only consume those things we like or are interested in: So the media companies produce material which appeals to the majority of their consumer base. This doesn't just encourage people to stick to their own way of thinking: It alienates each group from the others, so there is neither opportunity nor encouragement to grow in empathy with anyone different to ourselves.

I will illustrate this with 3 examples of cases where media coverage of minorities has changed my worldview

Firstly, I grew up on a farm in a small rural community at a time when Keating's Recession "that we had to have" meant we could not afford luxuries even as small as a packet of chocolate biscuits. Hence I can appreciate how different parts of Australian society- especially in rural and remote areas- can feel alienated, ignored or forgotten by policy-makers in Canberra and other city dwellers.

Now, I find that I disagree with many of the ideas Pauline Hanson, Bob Katta and others have shared- and I do not understand why they think that way. But I want to understand: I remember what it was like to live far from the city and do it tough. One way for me to better empathise is by listening to their stories, told in their own words, without the hyperbolae and spin which private media and politicians so love.

Secondly: I am white, and growing up I had no contact with Aboriginal people. In fact, I was terrified of them. Yet by watching shows on ABC and SBS made by indigenous Australians about themselves, I am beginning to get a better feel for these people about whom I know almost nothing. It has brought me to the point where I am not afraid to smile at them, or to chat with them.

A final example: For many years I was aggressively homophobic. Indeed, for many years a majority of Australian society thought this way. Yet recently a majority of us voted as a nation for marriage equality. How did such a dramatic change occur? I believe that Australian dramas featuring Australian actors, and Australian media coverage addressing the human suffering caused by these beliefs, helped us to have this dialogue as a nation.

In each of these cases, it is probable that these people disagreed with me as much as I did with them. But I want to better understand them. I hope that some of those guys might listen to my own story, and try to understand where I am coming from too.

In conclusion, we need to hear the stories of people from minority groups and with whom we disagree. We need to be willing to listen to such stories. We need to hear them presented in a way that shows they are people just like us.

It has been my experience that privately funded media does not meet this national need: We *need* the ABC to remain publicly funded so that it can continue doing so.

By removing public funding from the ABC, the opportunities for us to meet on that bridge are much less. How then can *both* sides grow in empathy and caring for people with whom we'd otherwise- at bestignore?

I believe that it is in our interest as a nation to have the greatest possible variety of opinions and needs engaged in empathic shared dialogue: Communal "storytelling". Only then will we retain such social cohesion as we have, while growing in empathy for the marginalised and alienated.

It is only by continuing to public fund the ABC that we will all have a hance to meet on this bridge and to grow together as a nation.


True, anyone can have an opinion, yet to have access to academics and otherwise inaccessible researchers and authorities is invaluable.



However, there is a meaningful mechanism whereby I can have my opinions heard and considered by the ABC. Such feedback to the commercial media is unlikely to even be seen by anyone in whom influence may be vested. There is NO validity to any argument that supports the proposition that with modern technology, the ABC is irrelevant. Quite the contrary, it's more important than ever that there should be a independent voice. I would point out that ABC "opinion" and "discussion" shows, such as "Q and A", "Insiders" etc. always have speakers from both Left and Right leaning journalists They also have their in-depth discussions with Ministers and Opposition Spokespersons in equal measure. Even "Media Watch" can and does criticise the ABC when criticism is due.

I'd be very happy to elaborate or discuss my position as required. I'm a 66 year old Farmer and Grazier and former Financial Planner. I do not support the editorial slant the ABC takes on many issues but I will defend the ABC to the full extent of my limited resources. Regards,


