It would change our industry for the better, create thousands of new jobs, huge taxes for the Government to support their ever dependant welfare nation and document how important Australia is on the global stage.

If there are fewer Australian stories on screen, a snapshot of Australian history is forgotten. congregation. Absurd history that has tarnished thousands of Australians. These	
stories need to be heard and accepted as part of our history. Good or bad - it's ou	r
country and we need to accept our failures and good fortunes and let them shape	
the generations to come.
